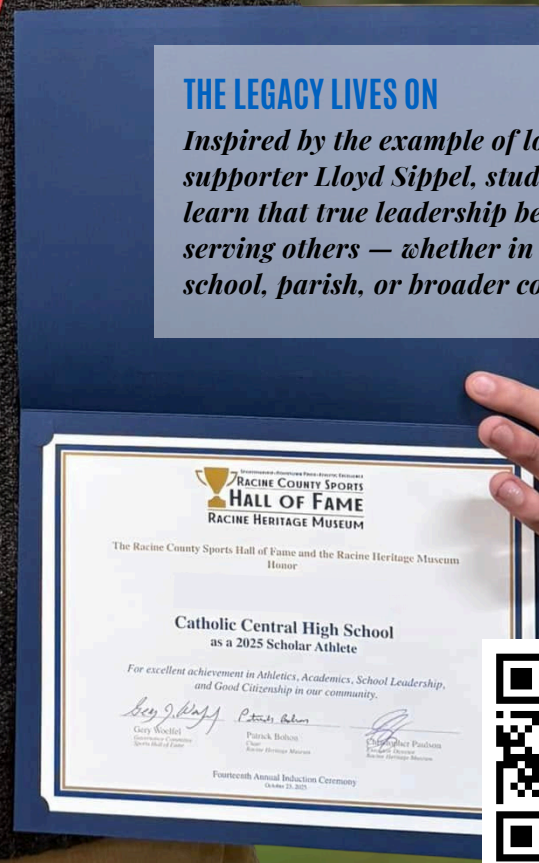

ALUMNI IN THE SPOTLIGHT

RITA MAURICE KEMEN-CLASS OF 1940



Rita was born in a "drafty old farmhouse" in Brighton to parents Alta (Hartnell) and George Maurice on July 27th, 1922. This was back when President Warren Harding first introduced the radio to the White House, Model T's were rolling off Ford's recently created moving assembly line, Prohibition was in effect and postage stamps were at two cents. She grew up on the family farm along with six other brothers and sisters - her twin sister Renata, twins Eugene and Carol, twins Raymond and Robert, and Mae.

Rita reminisces that living and growing up on the family farm consisted of chores, fieldwork and family fun. She especially remembers helping picking up stones, shocking grain and corn, milking the cows by hand and pitching hay. It seemed the weather was always the hottest when it was time to shock grain. Often times it was also her job to drive the family's team of horses when performing various farm tasks. She says the job she hated most was when they had to pick pickles every other day in their big pickle patch. Since at the time they did not have electricity, light came from kerosene lamps, cooking and heating water was done on a kitchen wood stove and their house was heated with a big coal stove in the living room. And of course there was the outdoor privy.

Rita attended and graduated from St. Francis Xavier grade school in Brighton. After graduating from St. Francis Xavier, Rita attended St. Mary's High School in Burlington. She has many fond memories of the years spent there. One of her favorite classes was Geometry. She still has her class workbook where she created many intricate geometric designs. She also had a lot of fun during her high school days. She remembers the good times they had sledding down the hill at the school during wintertime. She also participated in some of the school's plays. Rita graduated from St. Mary's on June 6th, 1940.

Rita has always been a strong supporter of Catholic schools. The seeds to this were planted all those years ago when she attended St. Francis Xavier Grade School and St. Mary's High School.

After graduating from St. Mary's High School, Rita worked for a time as a live in housekeeper/nanny for mothers needing extra help after a recent childbirth. She then got a job working at the Kenosha County Court House as chief clerk, secretary, and treasurer, in the agricultural department. She worked at the Court House until her marriage.

On May 28th, 1949, Rita was united in marriage to Aloysius "Allie" Kemen. He was the love of her life. Together they raised their four daughters, Mary, Carol, Helen and Cathy, on the family farm in the town of Paris. Rita was kept busy doing housework, yard work, gardening, cooking, baking, canning, sewing, etc.

Over the years Rita's many hobbies have included researching and compiling family history, flower arranging, collecting Santa and cardinal figurines, stamp collecting, quilting, bird watching and scrap booking (especially pictures of the Blessed Mother and pictures of Santa). She also enjoys watching Brewer, Packer, Bucks and Badger games. Rita is a lifetime member of St. Francis Xavier parish church in Brighton. She is a woman of strong faith.

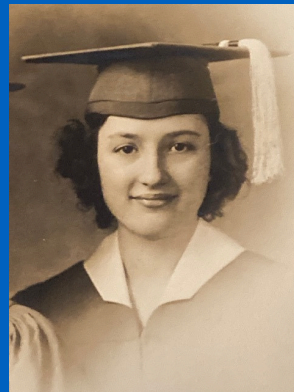
Over the years Rita has devoted many hours to St. Francis Xavier. Listed below are some examples of her devotion.

- She worked as assistant janitor for the church and school for twenty years.
- She served as parish sacristan for thirty-nine years.
- She repaired and painted many of the church's aging statuary.
- She was a choir member for many years.
- She served on the St. Francis school board.
- She taught first and second grade CCD for several years.
- She served in all offices of the parish's Christian Mothers and Altar Society.
- She was a member of the Quad Quilters.
- She worked at, and was often in charge of, various parish events and fund raisers.

Rita is also a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters, the Kenosha County Farm Bureau and the John Howland Pilgrim Society. She was also a fifty-year member of the Brighton Busy Homemaker Club where there was always an abundance of laughter and friendship each time the club members got together.

In addition to her four daughters Rita's family includes grandsons Matt and Mike, grandson Andrew and his wife Perla and great granddaughter Gianna. Sadly, her husband, Allie, passed away in 1998. Rita is always happiest when surrounded by her family.

Lastly, although at this stage in her life Rita can no longer get around and partake in activities like she once did, she finds great comfort when passing the time praying for us all.

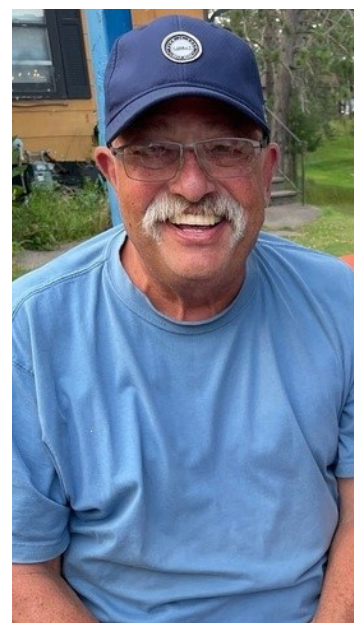

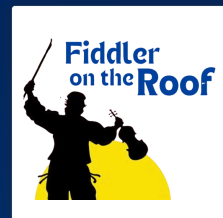
